The process for my remediation assignment started off with an idea. I had the idea that I wanted to argue for free college, but as I began working on my project, I realized that I was not really invested in that topic. I thought my topic had to be on something "serious," but then I met with Chris Dean and asked him if I could do it on something that was not as serious. I asked him if I could have my topic revolve around K-Pop, and we specifically talked about what I could do with it. I told him about how my friends don't understand why I listen to K-Pop and that is how my topic came to be. My topic ended up focusing on why people who do not speak Korean listen to K-Pop. I recently became a K-Pop fan and have grown passionate about it, so I thought this would be the perfect topic. After I got my topic down, I started by looking for pictures that I could use for evidence. I thought about what I could put in my presentation and began making a sort of rough draft. On each slide, I put down what I would put on the slide and made a sort of outline. I have used Prezi before for other presentations in high school, so I did not have trouble navigating or figuring out how Prezi worked. Putting down the information on the slides helped me figure out what evidence I was missing so that I could look for it. I put off my project for a while, but when I came back to it, I got serious and started perfecting it by adding animations and more pictures. When I felt like my presentation was done, I began to write a script for what I was going to say during my recording. I wrote a script that had word for word what I was going to say and even included actions like "go to the next slide." It made it much easier to record. I did not take as long recording as I thought, and the script really helped with that. I really tried my best on presenting my presentation in a way that would capture the viewer's attention.

When I met with Chris Dean, he asked me who my audience would be for my piece, and I told him that I would direct my piece towards people who hate on Korean Pop. I subconsciously also directed this to my friends who have always asked, "Why do you listen to K-pop if you can't even understand what they are saying?" That question has just gotten old, and I basically decided to explain that to them through this presentation. To appeal to my audience, I made my presentation easy to understand.
